

VDPAM 7496 - International Preceptorship

1. Basic information:

DVM Classification required (VM1-4). Undergraduate enrollment by instructor approval only. 1 credit per 40-hour week of experience, max 9 credits of 7490 level courses for graduation Satisfactory/Not Pass grading system.

Offered throughout the semester. Students must be registered in VDPAM 7496 before the start of their preceptorship.

3. Course Overview:

This elective course is designed to facilitate opportunities for students to participate in international veterinary educational opportunities in production and wildlife animals. Number of course credits depends on duration of program. This course counts toward DVM degree elective requirements (VM1-VM3 students are required to have 4 credits of electives; VM4 student elective requirements vary by option).

4. Prerequisites:

DVM classification is required. Undergraduate students may enroll only by instructor approval. All non-partnered programs must be pre-approved by the Course Coordinator. Email both the Course Coordinator Dr. Yuko Sato and Xiaoshuang Wei with the host institution name, proposed travel dates and a brief description of the experience to receive approval for the experience. Complete the approval process at least 3 months before the start of your preceptorship.

*To ensure radiation safety during your preceptorship, you are agreeing to make every effort to avoid radiation exposure during this preceptorship. You agree to remain outside any radiation work areas to avoid radiation exposure when radiographs, fluoroscopy, or nuclear scintigraphy are being performed. Otherwise, if radiation exposure is integral to the educational experience during this preceptorship. Please provide a copy of the radiation safety protocols at the preceptorship site to the Course Coordinator Dr. Yuko Sato. The preceptorship location's radiation safety protocols must be consistent with ISU Environmental Health & Safety standards in order for this experience to be approved. Please utilize a dosimeter badge from the preceptorship location that meets local requirements. The preceptorship location will notify of any out-of-range radiation exposure after badges are checked, in which case you agree to contact ISU Environmental Health & Safety for further consultation.

5. Course Registration:

After you have received approval from the course coordinator Dr. Yuko Sato, follow the below steps to register for VDPAM 7496 (you are not able to register for VDPAM 7496 yourself). It is your responsibility to make sure you are enrolled in VDPAM 7496 and for the correct term.

If your international experience is scheduled during your VM4 rotation year, please email Sarah Larkin (salarkin@iastate.edu) and Mindy Schminke (schminke@iastate.edu) to add VDPAM 7496 to your rotation schedule.

If your international experience is scheduled during your VM1-3 year, please email Mindy Schminke (schminke@iastate.edu) and ask to be registered for VDPAM 7496. If your experience takes place December through May, you should be registered for VDPAM 7496 for the Spring term (registration opens in late October). If your experience takes place in June through November, you should be registered for VDPAM 7496 for the Fall term (registration opens in late March). Please email Mindy only AFTER the registration is open for the respective term.

Note that registration for this course (as with any international or study abroad course) will incur a \$50 fee from the ISU Study Abroad Office. This fee covers required international safety and monitoring services, including the ISU Abroad Database and Alert Traveler. This fee will increase to \$85 starting in fall 2025.

6. Course Objectives:

The purpose of this course is to provide DVM students with opportunities to experience various aspects of production and wildlife medicine in international locations. Programs may involve clinical, didactic teaching, and/or research experience. Programs are individually designed by the student to meet their learning goals and objectives and to match their skills, experiences, and language proficiency. Students must seek assistance from the OASA International Programs Coordinator when designing their program.

Learning outcomes will vary based on individual program, but in general, after participating in this international preceptorship experience, students will be able to:

- Identify similarities and differences between veterinary medicine (clinical practice, didactic teaching, and/or research) in the host country/institution compared to the US and ISU-CVM.
- Describe how the preceptorship experience has enriched the student's cultural competence and role as a global citizen.
- Provide guidance to future students interested in international preceptorship programs.

7. Available Resources

Students can contact the OASA International Programs Coordinator (Xiaoshuang Wei) for assistance throughout this process, including <u>current active exchange partners</u>. Additionally, students can look at opportunities found in the <u>AVMA externship locator</u>.

8. International Travel Registration and Health Insurance

Complete your International Travel Registration.

All students who've completed the travel registration will be covered by the <u>International Health Insurance</u>. Review the <u>LVMC Foreign Travel Policy</u> and ensure that your post-travel plans meet quarantine requirements. Per this policy, you will need to complete a <u>Departure Form</u> to an external site. at least 2 weeks prior to departure, and an <u>Arrival Form</u> to an external site. as soon as possible on your return.

9. Grading

This course is graded using a **Satisfactory / Not-Pass** grading system. Several deliverables are required to pass the course and receive credit. Below is a list of required deliverables, due dates, and criteria for what constitutes a passing submission.
